My dear Mrs Livermore,

I hope you had a good time at Atlanta. I was so sorry that it was out of the question for me to go. As to that Saturday I am sorry to say that I had forgotten the change of dates for the course which I am to give at the Women's Union. They are Jan 20, 27, Feb. 2 and 9. I am afraid that will cut out a Saturday in New York. I shall be there from the 28th of Jan. to the 2nd of Feb. but that will not do you any good.

We had our rehearsal of the lantern slides and our Branch meeting on the 25th. A prize of \$100 is to be offered for an essay one of \$50 probably for some practical plans and the slides with a lecture will be loaned to the Branches who desire.

The Living wage for the professional woman was propsed as a topic for discussion since it is believed to be at the bottom of a possible change in ideals of living. It affects life after marriage quite as much as that of the single woman. What is essential to efficient living today? not existence . but full life and comfortable work and progress.

Miss Goodrich can tell you further plans as she is the new chairman of the committee.
