ag/11/55, Krska wrote: "I sent templates for the naves and window 3. the lancets in the lobby... I must call your attention that these windows must be set with new double-double vents and L.O.P. safety glass. Also a framework put on the outside for storm glass, which I will indicate on the full size drawing..

Canopy windows.

Subject: "Saint George and the Dragon, as a symbol of the Church's close alliance with the Church of England."

(Perhaps something like the 1892 west window - Saint George slaying the dragon. To have an angel with the index finger at her lips and a musical instrument.

O.E.S. report of Jan. 12, 1956, says, "The little window is in a west vestibule beside the chancel, facing north. It is 7 5/8 inches wide by 27 1/2 inches high sight; that is 1 1/2 square feet. 1/2" rebate, wood frame. It is in a small vestibule - gets a fair light. 31 inches from the floor. Sharply pointed Gothic head."

Small vestibule window, w<sup>e</sup> entrance near chancel.; The s<sup>tl</sup>l vestibule window is ddsigned to a scale twice as large as the east vestibule and therefore, their comparative sizes are a little misleading.

The dominant figure of the radiant angel with finger raised to her lips is set in a blue field and again, surrounded with decorative architectural canopy.

Below is the musical symbol of the Harp or lyre, and above, is the flame of religious zeal.
