Albuquerque, New Mexico.
Clerestory Window.**

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Saint Michael, the Archangel, casting the great dragon out of heaven, into the bottomless pit, is the main subject of the east clerestory window nearest the chancel. His shining, silvery white armor symbolizes the Divine protection he is given through Grace, and his own purity. The ruby reds of his cloak symbolize the valor that actually cloaks him, while his flaming sword suggests the Heavenly aid he is being given. Below the wounded dragon, the earth and sea are symbolized.

Above Saint Michael, we see the angel with the key to the bottomless pit and the great chain which bound Satan (Revelation 20/1-2). He is clothed in the Dalmatic, suggesting The Church, and in colors of red symbolizing courage, the white of purity, green of hope and the gold of Heavenly Glory.

The architecture of The Twelve Gates of Heaven is suggested at the tops of the twelve lancets in this series of clerestory windows, and the richly designed border of pomegranates is symbolic of the promises of Saint John's Revelation, - hope, the future life, the richness of Divine Grace, and a type of Resurrection of all true believers in Christ.
